The Board on Geographic Names, at its February 11, 1988 meeting, approved the names Pohaku Hanalei and Pohaku o Hanalei. The Hawaii Board on Geographic Names decided to name the northernmost of the two features currently named Pohaku Hanalei, Pohaku o Hanalei, to avoid confusion. These names will be published in Decision List 8801 and the entries will read as follows:

Pohaku Hanalei: peak, elevation 3,889 m (12,760 ft.), in Hawaii Volcanoes National Park, on SW slope of Mauna Loa, 2.1 km (1.3 mi.) SW of South Pit; Hawaii Co., Hawaii; 19°26'04" N, 155°37'24" W; USGS map - Mauna Loa 1:24,000.

Pohaku o Hanalei: peak, elevation 3,787 m (12,423 ft.), in Hawaii Volcanoes National Park, on NE slope of Mauna Loa, 2.6 km (1.6 mi.) NE of North Pit; Hawaii Co., Hawaii; 19°30'23" N, 155°33'28" W; USGS map - Kokoolau 1:24,000.
Not: Hanalei, Hanalei Peak, Peak of Hanalei.
