Dear Mr. Denicoff:

The following information is provided in response to our telephone conversation of 23 October 1970.

The Systems Support Group, Headquarters U.S. Marine Corps is headed by Brigadier General R. H. Spanjer. The Group is located in the office of the Chief of Staff, U.S.M.C. and is responsible for coordinating and directing staff activities related to development, implementation, and support of automated systems throughout the Marine Corps. To carry out these responsibilities, a continuing program of education must be provided for our functional managers as well as our technicians. Our visit to project MAC will enable us to take advantage of observing this most advanced method of utilization of man/machine interaction as a major element of effective Management Information Systems.

Specific types of information which is of interest to this group includes the following:

- a. Time Sharing/Slicing techniques employed.
- b. Basis of establishing priorities of work in the System.
- c. Types of remote entry devices used and methods of selection.
- d. Types of data communications used or anticipated for use in a system which is widely dispersed, geographically.
- e. Methods of determining Cost/Effectiveness of the total ADP/ COMM package, and means of measuring systems effectiveness.
- f. Systems Costs, categorized by hardware, software, and data communications.
- g. System Operating Procedures.
- h. Training requirements and lead time for operations personnel.

- i. User training requirements
- j. Written information concerning the above topics would also be appreciated.


